



"teddy is a seven year old who has at the Bob Burdette Center attended afterschool for three years. He resides in Kanawha County and was referred to BBC because his family was in need of after school care that could provide both academic and emotional support. He lives with his grandparents, who are his guardians. His father was incarcerated for most of Teddy's childhood. When he was released from prison, he died within a week from an overdose. The Bob Burdette Center has provided Teddy with afterschool and summer programming, including skill-based tutoring. His grandmother said, "Thank you for going above and beyond for our family during these hard times. You could have turned your back but you chose to help (him) instead. The world is a cold place, but you reminded us that not everyone is. Thank you for caring about and loving our boy." Teddy continues to attend the afterschool program and receive education and social-emotional supports.

is 47 years old and lives in Kanawha



County. She came to Recovery Point Charleston to seek help with her substance use disorder. She was a teacher, married, and a mother of three children. Unfortunately she experienced a tragic car accident at the age of 31 that caused a severe back injury. She had to have back surgery and took medication to endure the pain. She became addicted. Recovery Point taught her that she is more than this disease. Sara has been clean for three years and been reunited with her children and family. Sara shared, "Recovery Point Charleston has given me my life back. I find my disease to be a blessing now because I am able to help others who share the same struggles. If it wasn't for my sisters and the staff at Recovery Point, I do not think I would be here today." Sara has regained custody of all three of her children, where she has stable housing and a stable job. She works full-time, but still makes it a priority to come back to Recovery Point to teach classes and provide encouragement to others.
