PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



We began our 2023-2024 campaign season asking ourselves and others "Why Say Yes" to United Way? Why say yes to donating or volunteering? What happens when I say yes? And more importantly, what happens if I don't? We are so excited to tell you that nearly 3,000 people said YES to donating, 1,824 people said YES to volunteering and dozens of you said YES to serving on committees or as members of our board. And, of course, twelve people said YES to dancing!

It's been incredibly humbling to hear the many reasons people said YES. For example, United Way multiplies the impact of my donation; we want the best community for our kids and grandkids; United Way always answers the call to serve our neighbors in need; United Way creates positive solutions; doing my part provides a big impact; I know with certainty that every donor dollar is used to support life-altering work. And we could go on.

All of us, saying YES together, allowed us to positively impact 83,343 lives in 2023. Every \$5 vote for dancing, every DUCK adopted, every dollar from a workplace campaign makes a difference.
Supporting the important work of 37 nonprofit partners, providing over 1,200 pairs of shoes through our Equal Footing Shoe Fund, ensuring that 23 families identified as ALICE received help, and 52 households received housing assistance through our UNITED WE HOUSE program.

We said YES to disaster support when hundreds of people lost gas and water services last November on the West Side of Charleston. Answering over 2,000 calls from people needing water, blankets, and heaters and then delivering to over 100 of those who didn't have access to help.

It's important to also mention that we have a wonderful team of people who said YES to hard work and dedication. Our staff spent hours supporting Dancing with the Stars events, attending workplace presentations, planning a DUCK RACE, welcoming Tony Caridi and preparing for our annual Day of Caring. They answer our door daily with care and compassion and answered over 7,000 WV 211 calls throughout the year.

We are happy to share that our United Way – most importantly YOUR United Way – is strong and striving every day to say YES to creating positive impact in the communities we serve. We have had successful fundraisers and friend raisers and look forward to taking advantage of the momentum you have helped us create.

Looking ahead to a new fiscal year and our next campaign season, we will continue to ask our community to say YES to United Way! We are committed to addressing the root causes of our most challenging issues, striving every day to make our communities stronger. WHEN YOU SAY YES you are part of something bigger than yourself. 

Education Success - KVC Behavioral Healthcare West Virginia First Star Academy of WV

KVC West Virginia's First Star Academy played a pivotal role in DL's life, providing a crucial support system that helped him navigate and overcome significant challenges. Initially grappling with social anxiety and deep-seated trauma, DL found solace and encouragement among compassionate staff, mentors, and peers who understood his journey. Their unwavering support enabled DL to gradually open up, build trust, and discover his own potential.

Through the academy's nurturing environment and opportunities for personal growth, DL not only conquered his initial hesitations but also embraced new adventures and experiences. His transformation from a reserved teen to a resilient young man was evident to all, especially his foster mom, who witnessed his newfound confidence and sense of belonging.

The academy became more than a program; it became DL's second family. During pivotal moments like the summer outing, DL openly shared his past and celebrated the supportive community that had become integral to his life. This environment of care and belief in oneself proved transformative, empowering DL to recognize his strengths and strive toward a brighter future.

In essence, KVC West Virginia's First Star Academy empowered DL to flourish, demonstrating the profound impact of supportive communities in nurturing resilience and fostering personal growth.



Health Challenges - Gabriel Project of West Virginia

In March 2023, a distressed young mother reached out to the Gabriel Project's St. Albans site in desperate need of specialized formula for her newborn daughter. Born with severe allergies that standard formulas exacerbated, the baby could only tolerate Enfamil's PurAmino, a costly option the mother couldn't afford while awaiting WIC approval. Thanks to United Way of Central West Virginia's financial support, the Gabriel Project swiftly provided two cans of PurAmino, easing the family's immediate burden. Overwhelmed with relief, the mother tearfully expressed gratitude. While the baby's formula needs were met, ongoing support includes hypoallergenic diapers and wipes, ensuring comfort for her sensitive skin.



Financial Stability - Rea of Hope

Julia started using drugs and alcohol at the age of 13, dropped out of school at 17, and became pregnant. Julia was able to remain sober for 7 years, until she entered an abusive relationship with her second child's father. Her drug use progressed, she stole things to support her habit and lost custody of her children. In December 2021, Julia was arrested for the second time and was sentenced to 5 years in prison.

Just a month before parole, Julia heard from a friend who was in recovery at RGSWV, and convinced Julia to fill out the application for the program. She was accepted into the program, and Julia saw the benefits of staying sober. She took classes at RGSWV and New Directions at Logan County Day Report Center. Through the courses, she learned how to manage money, take care of debts and save for the future. She obtained her GED, and through the REACH Initiative at RGSWV, she participated in the Job Readiness Curriculum and Resume Writing classes. Julia also joined Recovery Coach Classes through WV Jobs and Hope. She began to set career goals and became a Night Tech at RGSWV and is a Recovery Coach with Logan County's Quick Response Team.



Basic Needs are Met - Kanawha Valley Fellowship Home


 J.W., a 31-year-old from Putnam County, battled opiate addiction for over 15 years, exacerbated by heroin laced with fentanyl. Despite several attempts at treatment since 2019, including a family intervention and various programs, sustained sobriety eluded him.
Even the birth of his beloved daughter couldn't anchor him in recovery as child services intervened, granting custody to his parents due to both parents' addiction struggles.

In April 2022, J.W. reluctantly joined Kanawha Valley Fellowship Home's structured sober living program. Initially resistant, he gradually embraced the program's structure, counseling, nutritious meals, and community support. Passing regular screenings, he transitioned to their sober living apartments by April 2023, regaining his license and securing stable employment. His journey flourished, marked by personal milestones like gaining full custody of his daughter, moving into a two-bedroom apartment provided by KVFH, and thriving in his commitment to sobriety.

Despite challenges with his daughter's mother's ongoing addiction, J.W. remains dedicated to their bright future, empowered by the supportive recovery community at Kanawha Valley Fellowship Home. Each day, he continues to offer hope and service to others navigating their own paths to sobriety.

2023 Funded Partner Results

In 2023, United Way of Central WV impacted **83,343** individuals across Boone, Braxton, Clay, Kanawha, Logan, and Putnam Counties through funded programs. These initiatives focused on education, financial stability, health, and safety net/basic needs. Our partners achieved diverse outcomes, including improving literacy and school attendance, providing job skills training and financial literacy, enhancing healthcare access, supporting successful addiction recovery, delivering dental and therapy services, and addressing basic needs like food and shelter. Individuals are better equipped to live to their fullest potential because of the remarkable support of United Way donors and volunteers — because of you, our community thrives with hope and opportunity.
